
Kerri holds a B.A. in English literature from LeMoyne College and an M.A. in arts and media management from Columbia College.

Lately, students have learned about the water cycle and created their own water cycle bracelet. Our last presentation will be on pollinators in April and May.

All programs are free of cost thanks to our donors and partners. These presentations make excellent curricular tie-ins. Are you interested in increased crop yields, decreased input costs and increased resilience to weather extremes? NRCS provides assistance to develop a specialized conservation plan for your agricultural or forestland operation.

A conservation plan can help you to identify resource concerns along with an opportunity to explore and select conservation practices that can address these concerns. Once you have a plan, financial incentives can support implementation of conservation practices.

Whether you are a grain producer, livestock producer, specialty crop producer or a forest landowner there are opportunities available for you and your operation.

Have you considered cover crops, reduced-till, strip-till, no-till or nutrient management? Interested in building soil health, creating wildlife habitat or tree/shrub plantings? Need to address erosion concerns with the recent weather events?

Now is time to contact NRCS, at your local field office, in Kendall County, to learn about new opportunities for conservation on your farm, information on available programs, conservation practices eligible for financial incentives and the program application process.

Even if you are not currently ready to implement any new conservation practices, now is a great time to create a conservation plan and explore expanded financial opportunities that are available to support implementing your plan.
